Legally Blind Are Eligible For Benefits
Are you "legally blind"? It is commonly thought that to receive various services for blind people are eligible the individual must be totally lacking in sight. However, a citizen is entitled to receive all benefits which "he blind" are eligible if his sight is (1) of an acute, after all possible correction by glasses, less than twenty or two-hundredths of an inch; or (2) his central or side vision, after maximum correction by glasses, subtends an angle of less than 5 degrees.
In general, people with this degree of visual loss are able to read the headlines in a newspaper, but not the small print. Others are aware of a large "blind spot" in their vision. Those who meet the requirements are entitled among other benefits, to the following:
(A) An extra personal income tax exemption of \$600.
(B) A property tax exemption on the first \$2,000 assessed value.
(C) In some cases, a non-service-connected Veteran's Administration pension.
Persons with the degree of visual loss described above have several problems connected with this disability. A person whose vision is limited in this way may utilize the counseling and guidance services of the Blind Service Center, a non-sectarian, non-profit organization, whose goal is to help the visually limited.

Great Cities Director Set To Speak Here
Dr. Carl Marburger, Director of Detroit's Great Cities School Improvement Program, will be the featured speaker at the current fair at the Disciples Group of the Universalist-Unitarian Church in Farmington City Sunday, January 26.
Detroit's Great Cities Project is a group of fourteen similar efforts by boards of education, assisted by Ford Foundation grants to cope with the rapidly growing percentage of disadvantaged children in inner-city schools.
In 1950 one child in 10 in those Great Cities was considered a child with limited background. By 1960, this figure had grown to one in three and the projection for 1970 is one child in two who will bring varying degrees of disabling disadvantage to the school.
THE PROJECTS of the Great Cities School Improvement Program are experimental and intended to serve as demonstration projects. They assume that the problems of disadvantaged youth can be effectively and economically solved by:
1.) Development of a program of education adapted to the special needs of these children; 2.) Modifications in the organizational patterns within schools; 3.) Proper selection and utilization of personnel; 4.) Improved utilization of instructional equipment and materials; 5.) Involvement of parents and the community in the educational program.
At the Sunday session, 11 a.m., Dr. Marburger will detail the program of the Great Cities project in Detroit and will explain why such preventive approaches are relatively inexpensive in the long run as well as more humane than the present neglect of inner-city youth in under staffed and under-financed schools.
