

Raider Cagers Bow to Trojans

The North Farmington Raiders basketball team met the Greenview Trojan cagers and lost in the non-league battle 43-38, in one of their sloppiest games of the 1963-64 season.

The Raiders, who are leading the Northwest Suburban League, played host to CHS last Saturday, January 18. NFHS has to score only four points in the first quarter, due to bad passes and a shabby team effort. CHS took advantage of NFHS' mistakes and owned a 21.3 half-time lead.

NORTH'S offense recovered somewhat from first half play, but their sloppy play earlier had already cost them the game and placed their season record under 500.

Roy Duce paced the mistake-ridden Raiders as he collected 20 points. Game honors were taken by Dave Graves of CHS with 18.

Thurston High School, who is tied with the Raiders with a 3-0 conference record, will travel to North Farmington tomorrow for a battle for league leadership. Game time is 8 p. m.

Dick Johnston saw his winning streak stopped at three victories as he fell to Southfield's 154 pounder on an 11-8 decision.

Farmington's list three grapplers Doug Kuffel, Fred Burton, and heavyweight Dan Klawender suffered setbacks by their opponents, as the Jays captured the last eight matches of the meet.

Now 0-2 in league play, the matmen will attempt to get back in the win column tonight when they play host to Berkeley at 8:00.
