How to Avoid Ski Accidents

Therapeutic Notes, which is edited by Dr. Harry E. Canale, explains that the rising popularity of skiing has been accompanied by an inevitable increase in the number of injuries occurring on the slopes.

Probably the most frequent reason for skiing accidents is inexperience of the skier, followed closely by loss of confidence (which may happen when snow conditions change suddenly or following an injury), and fatigue.

"The role of fatigue is evidenced by the high incidence of accidents at the end of the day."

MOST COMMON of all skiing injuries, according to the journal, are sprains, especially those affecting the ankle or knee.

"Knee sprains occur more often in women, regardless of their ability as skiers."

"Ankle sprains vary both with age and ability, but happen more frequently among female beginners and among experts."

Records show that though beginners are more likely to suffer injuries while skiing, these injuries are less likely to be as severe as those acquired by more advanced skiers.

Falcons Hold Onto First Place By Beating Berkley Bears, 53-48

The high-flying Farmington High School basketball team maintained its hold on first place in the Inter-Lakes Conference last Friday night by hustling past a strong Berkley squad, 53-48.

In spite of the fact Falcon coach Jack Quiggle was minus one of his big guns, Dave Schack, who was sidelined with a sprained ankle, Farmington took command from the opening whistle and held their mastery over the Bears throughout the game.

Good rebounding from forward Bob Lorenz, who also netted nine points for the Falcons, smoothed the way to victory against Berkley, which came the fourth league victim humbled by Farmington this year.

The only league rival to upset the Falcons express this year is Walpole Lake, which plays host to Farmington this Friday night (January 31) in the Viking gym.

OLS Wrestlers Post 5th Win In Duel Meet Action Jan. 23

The Our Lady of Sorrows wrestling team notched another victory in action last week, downing L'Anse-Creusse 40 to 14, in the Lancer Gym Jan. 23.

Now owning a 5-2 dual meet record with six regular meets left in the season, the Lancers are well on their way to another fine year of wrestling.

THE HIGH POINT of the week's action came last Saturday when OLS competed in the Catholic Central Tournament and captured third place with a 65-point team total. Lancer wrestlers captured three first place berths in the CC tourney.

A record setting performance was turned in by Lancer stand-out Mike LaFond in the L'Anse-Creusse meet. The 154-pound LaFond pinned his opponent in 20 seconds to a new school record for OLS. The previous mark of 20 seconds for a wrestling meet pin was also owned by LaFond, set by him in a junior.

LaFond, who wrestled in the weight division normally assigned to Stan Secosky against L'Anse-Creusse, also captured first place honors at the 154-pound weight in the CC tourney.

Secosky, who sat out the L'Anse-Creusse meet, showed he didn't lose his technique as he took first place in the 145-pound weight division in the CC Tourney with victories in three straight matches.

One of the opponents to face Secosky was last year's 133-pound Regional Champion, Mike Fitzgerald of Ann Arbor. St. Thomas Secosky won a hard-fought 3-0 decision over Fitzgerald, who last year beat the Lancers' Dave LaFond, first of the LaFond brothers to earn a name on the OLS wrestling team by amassing a string of undefeated dual meet matches that hit 40 during his three years of varsity wrestling.

It was the second straight tournament championship earned by Secosky this season who will be looking for his 30th straight undefeated dual meet match when the Lancers travel to Willow Run next Tuesday, February 4.

In the battle for league leadership, Thurston set to a 10-6 first quarter lead, in the second period both teams settled down to a 10-6 tie. In the third quarter, the Raiders 13-12, but went to the locker room on the short end of a 23-19 score.
