

Offering Supt. 5-Yr. Contract

By unanimous roll call vote, the Board of Education approved the offering of a five-year contract to E. Schmidt, Superintendent of Schools, whose present contract has two years to run.

The new contract would replace the existing one and would be effective starting July 1, 1964.

Details relative to responsibilities, possible changes in administrative staff structure, district responsibilities, and possible change in salary are to be discussed at a later date before formal approval of the final draft of the contract.

Plan MEA Camp This Weekend

The whys and hows of professional negotiations for teachers will be the theme of the Michigan Education Association's 35th Year Leaders' Conference, January 31-February 1, at the MEA Camp, Battle Creek.

Approximately 800 officials are expected to attend the two-day workshop which will open with registration at 4:30 p.m. Friday, January 31. The conference's first general session, at 7:15 Friday evening, will feature a discussion of "Why Professional Negotiations?" by Martha Miers, assistant director of the National Education Association's research division.

SATURDAY'S first general session, at 8 a.m., will include a panel discussion of the "Strengths and Objectives of the United Profession." Panel members will be: Robert Campbell, state NEA director; a teacher in the Midland schools; Les Lonsberry, MEA membership consultant; and William Hodge, midwestern representative for the NEA.

Daniel H. Kruger, assistant director of the department of labor and industrial relations, Michigan State University, will address the conference's third general session which is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Saturday.

Kruger's topic will be "Implementing the Program of Professional Negotiations."

A question and answer period is set for the workshop's final session, Saturday at 2 p.m. Panel members for the discussion will be: Kruger; Norman Weinshimer, Highland Park superintendent of schools; Joe Sullivan, Romeo High School teacher; and Gerald Simmons, director of MEA field services.

Small group meetings and discussion periods will round out the agenda and the conference will close at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Speaks Tonight At ACE Meeting

The Southern Oakland County Branch of the Association for Childhood Education will hold a dinner meeting at Kimball High School, Royal Oak, at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, January 29. Dr. Margaret Sterne, the guest speaker, will discuss "The Problem of Berlin."

Dr. Sterne was born in Frankfurt am Main, Germany. She studied at the University of Berlin. In 1929 Dr. Sterne came to the United States and spent the next few years writing articles for newspapers and magazines. She received her Master's degree in History from Wayne University in 1931. The following year she began teaching History at the University. Dr. Sterne received her Ph.D. degree from the University of Michigan in 1931.

In 1932, Dr. Sterne was awarded a Fulbright Research Scholarship for Austria. The United States Foreign Service in 1935 asked Dr. Sterne to return to Germany and Austria to deliver a series of lectures.
