**Historical Society Contributes
Books of Interest On Past**

New to the library this week, and on display now and for the next several days is a photograph of a book published first in Farmington, New York.

Farmington, Michigan would not exist today had it not been for Quaker settlers who moved here in 1824. The book of interest to Farmington people because it mentions many family names long familiar to Farmington residents.

Mrs. Vayle Lorton, curator for the Farmington Historical Society, came upon the book quite by accident last summer while traveling and studying in New York State.

A SECOND BOOK, a diary, is also news for local historians. Mrs. Lorton announced receipt of the book as a gift from Mr. and Mrs. Paul Burton, 12 Mile Rd., at the January meeting of the Society. The diary belonged to Mr. Burton's grandfather.

A few entries are of significance and of special interest. The entry for Wednesday, September 27, 1876 tells of the first meeting ever held in the Township Hall. The entry, in part, reads: "Attended a Republican meeting at the village in the evening which was addressed by Mark S. Brewer, candidate for Congress from the 6th District."

Entries for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, October 5, 6, and 7 for the same year give insight to what was once one of the popular diversions of the era—the traveling lectures.

Grandfather Burton reports bearing a Professor Mills on these dates. Topic on Thurs. day: "Memorials on Fri. day: "Courtship, Love, and Marriage;" on Saturday: "Hot and Cold Feet."
