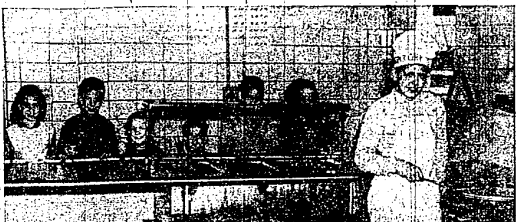
World Vision Conference Set For Feb. 9 to 16
