FHS Grad Enters Army Signal School

Private Douglas L. He is a 1951 graduate of R.E.T.S. Electronic School and a 1953 graduate of Farmington High School.
Admission to the Signal School is limited to men of outstanding promise. Classed as a technical institute, the school gives training chiefly in the operation, maintenance, and repair of forty different types of electronic equipment, from radio and television sets to "electronic brains." Courses are given also in meteorology and both motion-picture and still photography.
A YEARLY average of 6,000 enlisted men are selected for admission. All are chosen from among the Army's best in point of intelligence, educational attainments, and practical ability.
The Signal School courses range in length. All are designed to qualify the enlisted student for higher rank and more responsible duties in the Army.
