The founders, Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst, recognized the need for an organization that would bring about a better relationship between the educators and parents and thereby promote the well-being of all children and youth. During the years that followed its illustrious beginning the movement has spread throughout this country and into many other parts of the world.

In the United States the membership of all the local associations in each state constitutes the membership of the national organization which is an integral part of the National Organization. A district or region is a geographical division of the state and aids in the administration of state congress affairs. A council is comprised of a group of local units in a town, village, city or other designated area organized for the purpose of the authorization of the State Congress.

WHILE EACH of these branches have their own characteristics, and their own jobs to perform, the underlying purposes are the same, which are listed in the by-laws of each association as follows:

To promote the welfare of youth in home, school, church and community.

The school multi-purpose room, decorated in blue and gold, was the setting for the dinner and in the front of the room were portraits of the P.T.A. founders, Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst.

A short program followed the dinner with a short history of the P.T.A. given by the president, Johnson. He also introduced the guests of the evening, Mrs. Lillian Paul, who served as Shiawassee P.T.A. president from 1957 to 1959 and Mrs. Martha Humecky who was president from 1959 to 1961. Thomas Westlerlin, president from 1961 to 1963 and Mrs. Hilda DuBay, president from 1963 to 1965 were unable to attend.

Also present and to take part in the program were officers and members of the Liberty Motorcycle Club, which as a civic project presented the Shiawassee School with a new American flag to replace the one which flies over the school yard presently.

Shiawassee P.T.A. reached its ninth anniversary on January 10.
