Hall stated that the total number of police officers would be raised to 10 if additional men could be hired in the event the proposed millage was approved by township voters.

Supervisor Hall answered the bare minimum would be seven new officers which would allow the department to have at least four patrol cars on the road. At the present time only half this number are on patrol duty at any one time.

Supervisor Hall was asked by trustee Earl Oppenheuser how much of the new revenue would be used to purchase buildings and sites for the township fire department.

It was pointed out by Hall that several new fire station locations are presently under consideration and the earliest possible purchase of these sites would result in an appreciable savings to the taxpayers since property values in these particular areas will continue to rise in the face of further development. Problems of gaining acceptance to the building of fire stations in well developed areas would also be eliminated if the funds to purchase sites presently under consideration was made possible through the approval of the proposed 2 mill tax.

THE BOARD was further apprised that the township's present volunteer fire department and the 1964 vintage fire engine would mean increased insurance rates for residents unless in the next few years a considerable improvement was made possible.

The township hopes, with the added millage, to take the initial steps of setting up a full-time fire department which can man fire stations 24 hours a day with up to date equipment.

The proposed 2 mill tax would be in effect for a ten-year period and revenue from the tax would be used solely for police and fire protection in the township.

basis for the 1964-65 school year beginning in September.

A budget of \$1,000 for expenses of the program from mid-March through the end of June and \$5,000 for the program for the 1964-65 school year as suggested by Supt. G. W. Harrison, was approved by the Board of Education.

Supt. Harrison pointed out in a report to the Board that both the state and federal governments were interested in seeing programs of this kind developed by local school districts and that state and federal funds were available for this purpose. Reimbursement for 40 percent of the cost of state and federal funds for the first year can be received, he said. This reimbursement would be decreased over a three-year period to about a 25 per cent level where it would remain for future years, the superintendent of schools stated.

It is felt to be reasonably certain that a vocational training program such as the one proposed would be helpful in two areas. One of these would be the fact that it would probably decrease the percentage of students presently dropping out of school before graduating. The other, which is felt to be equally as important, is the fact that it would give adequate training to obtain jobs to those boys and girls who will be unable to go on to take advanced schooling after completing high school.
