Twp. Fire Dept. Report For 1963 Shows Record 461 Runs Handled

The Farmington Township Fire Department's annual re-port was made this week and revealed that in 1963 the town-ship's volunteer firemen re-sponded to a record 461 calls.

Fire calls have nearly dou-bled in the last five years. There were a total of 258 calls made by the township firemen in 1958.

There are four fire stations which handled the 461 calls last year, one located to serve each courter of the township, with Station No. 3. at Wheeler Street, or a read of River. handling more fires than any of the other three fire stations.

THE YEARLY REPORT showed a total of 173 grass fires topped all other types of calls for firemen, with house and car fires alloud units of the stations.

House fires were down slightly from the number handled in 1931 and 1962. But car fires and 1962 stations over the past five years.

Property damage and loss due to fires in 1932 was estimated at \$13,000 which is down from what it was in recent years owing to the deven number of house fires handled last year.
