Finishing in second place in the conference, the debaters accumulated five victories and sustained only three defeats. The affirmative team of Mike Gale and Mary Dodd won three matches, at the same time lost one, while Sandy Austin and Keith Thompson of the negative team won two and lost two.

Farmington led the conference all year and were caught and passed by Southfield — a school which teaches debating as a class — only in the last debate of the conference season.

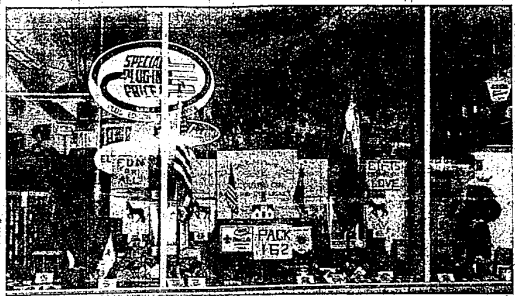
