FHS Students Post Mostly B and C Grades

A compilation of semester grades shows that the majority of FHS students have B and C grades in academic classes as well as non-academic classes.

The department with the largest number of A's is Social Studies, whereas Art has the least number.

English classes show the greatest amount of B's and C's with Social Studies coming in closely behind. The least number of B's and C's lies in Home Economics and Music, respectively.

The largest number of D's is in Social Studies classes, but the Music classes have no D's at all.

Math has the largest amount of failing grades, with Driver Education, Languages, and Music having no E's. There were only 56 conditions in all the classes combined; Driver Education had 21 of them.

As a whole, the percentages of all the grades are as follows: A—8.1 per cent, B—34.3 per cent, C—35.2 per cent, D—19.2 per cent, and E—4.47 per cent.

Farmington Players to Stage Final Performance of 'Rain'

Davidson, who in the tropical downpour, pen together in an emotional-charged interval in a hotel in Papa Pago. The suppressed clergyman tries to save the wanton girl's soul and send her back to San Francisco where a prison sentence awaits her for a crime for which she had been "framed" but had committed. Having atoned and repulsed an adoring marine who wants her to leave with him for Sidney, Australia in the hope of finding a happier life, Sadie later becomes disillusioned when the missionary falls in love with her.

MERLE PEDICINI is seen here in the role of the gaudy but fine-hearted Sadie Thompson, Joseph Papp as the withering Rev. Davidson, and James Blovis as Sadie's marine friend who she calls "Handsome." Other leading roles are being portrayed by Dorothy Millard, Max Millard, Betty Craig, Mary Ann Perry, and Robert Thomas. They are supported by Hilmer Howard, Douglas Galbraith, Dennis Broadhead, Malinda and Hugh Phillips, in the Players' production of "Rain," which is being directed by Hope Nahstoll.

New Expansion Being Planned At Country Day

Detroit Country Day School, Michigan's oldest independent boys college preparatory school, will increase its enrollment by 30 students to a total of 220 in the Upper School (grades seven through twelve) for the 1964-65 school year.

"This increase is necessary," said Dr. W. Rodman Snelling, headmaster, "if Country Day is to continue to serve the Metropolitan Area in the manner it has for the past fifty years." He went on to explain that ability-testing, special courses, and small classes leading to advanced college placement will continue to be the trademark of Country Day as a quality facility. Members are being added to maintain the low student teacher ratio of 10 to 1 in instructional sections.

ENROLLMENT in the Lower School (Kindergarten through grade six) will remain approximately the same at 150 pupils. The Lower School at Country Day is co-educational with an average class of approximately 30 pupils. Ability groupings and advanced work sections are utilized in the Lower School.

Entrance examinations are given during the month of March and applications for all grade levels will be taken until March 10. Admission to the school is predicated upon aptitude tests plus achievement tests in Mathematics and English.

The main building was expanded during the summer and fall of 1953 to provide the additional classrooms necessary for the larger number of students. Along with expansion of the main building, the physical activity areas are being expanded to provide the physical education necessary to accommodate the increased number of boys participating in team sports.

This increase is another stage in the unbroken policy of the Board of Trustees to expand the Upper School to a total of 250 boys by 1955-56.
