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

Richard H. Snook, director of both band and orchestra at Grose Pointe High, will bring his outstanding high school symphony orchestra to Farmington February 21. An afternoon assembly will be given to J. R. Duncanson students and an evening concert for the public at North Farmington at 8 p.m.

IT IS THE DESIRE of the Music Department of the Farmington Public Schools to give these outstanding musicians a warm welcome. Remember February 21, 8 p.m. at North Farmington.

Tickets will be available at the door for both students and adults at a nominal fee.

Featured in this concert will be Susan Ascan, pianist, and Milford Golsin, violinist.

Susan will play two solo piano passages in the Copland's "Outdoor Overture" and Snook's "Symphony of Memories."

Milford will perform Beethoven's Romance for violin and orchestra.

IN ADDITION to these numbers, the orchestra will perform the following selections:

"Hear Thou O Lord, My Prayer," from the Russian Liturgy; "An Outdoor Overture," by Aaron Copland (1900); "Romance for Violin and Orchestra Op. 30," by Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827); Milford Golsin, violin soloist; "Symphony in C Major," by Ignaz Joseph Pleyel (1787-1821); 1st Movement, Adagio, and Allegro molto.

"Finlandia, Tone Poem," by Jean Sibelius (1865-1957); "Concerto in A Minor for Violin and String Orchestra," by Antonio Vivaldi (1658-1743).

Violin Soloists: Judy Carnes, Nancy Cary, Deborah Ferris, Pamela Gutschman, Milford Golsin, Ruth Herder, Karl Schneider, and Karen Thomas.

This is a work found usually in the repertoire of young aspiring violinists. It is usually performed by one solo instrument. In this case, the entire first violin section is featured as a unit performing the solo violin part.

"Symphony of Memories" arranged by R. H. Snook.

This piece was written specifically for the Grose Pointe High School Symphony Orchestra's appearance before the National Principals Association Convention in February 1964.

It was "re-activated" for an inspirational appearance of the orchestra before the Midwest Conference of Music Educators at the University of Michigan on January 18, 1964.

"Bacchanale from Samson and Delilah," by Camille Saint-Saens (1835-1921), will close the program.

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OPEN LETTER TO FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP PROPERTY OWNERS

February 17, 1964.

DEAR HOMEOWNER:

As you know, the Township of Farmington is about to proceed with an innovation in zoning which will vitally affect the future of your property, your children and you. Don't be passive!!! Plans have been submitted for the Olde Franklin Towne Subdivision. The proposed plans provide that houses will be built on lots much smaller than those previously required in the Community. The Planning Board has approved the proposed plat under the new ordinance on the theory that certain acreage in the subdivision will be set aside for natural habitat and so-called recreational areas. This concept, while having great merit in theory, will have the practical effect of increasing the density not only in the particular subdivision area but also in our schools, our existing recreational facilities, our Police and Fire facilities, our roadways, and any other municipal services. To comment specifically on the plan would take much more than can be expressed in this letter, but an example might prove worthwhile:

In one of the areas designated as "natural habitat or recreational area" in the proposed plat, the Developer baldly states that he will erect a pump house in that area. Certainly, this even flies in the face of the theory of the Planners of Farmington Township.

We suggest that if you are interested in smaller lots—if you are interested in greater traffic hazards—if you are interested in overcrowded schools—if you are interested in additionally taxing our Police and Fire facilities—if you are interested in generally decreasing the value of your property, then you should ignore this letter; however, if you oppose these obvious hazards, then
