A review of the Flouride Program, as follows, is deemed necessary at this time to better acquaint the community with the treatments.

The Farmington P.T.A. in co-operation with the Oakland County Health Department and the Michigan Department of Health, began the program two years ago. The treatments are given to the children by trained

personnel under the direction of a qualified dental authority. The program is made available to kindergarten, second, fifth, and eighth graders. It is at these age levels the applications are most effective.

THE CLINIC is set up in all the schools including Our Lady of Sorrows, during school hours. As the series of treatments are completed in one school, the clinic moves on to another. Prior to the time the Clinic is scheduled for any one school, the parents receive a form to be filled out and signed if they wish their child to participate.

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

"European and American Glass" will be the subject on April 29 at 1:30 p.m. when Mr. Paul Perrot, Director of the Corning Museum of Glass, N.Y., will close the series.
