Earlier, Rev. Bristab served the Methodist Church in Warren and the St. Luke's Methodist Church in Detroit. He attended Albion College, Chicago Theological Seminary, and Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, Rochester, N.Y. He was born in Alberta, Canada but has lived most of his life in the Detroit area.
NURSERY and Kindergarten facilities will be provided for small children during the evening. There will be special music by the Chancel Choir under the direction of Mrs. William Greene. A coffee hour will follow the services.
On Wednesday, March 11, Rev. Philip H. Tompkins of First Methodist Church, Warren, will preach about "The Meaning of the Cross." Dr. John S. Jurek of Mt. Holyoke Seminary, Northampton, Mass., will speak about "The Church Within the Church" on March 18.

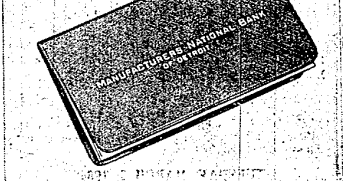
Area U-D Coed On Dean's List
