William E. Lang Seeks Prosecutor's Office

Veteran Senior Assistant Prosecutor, William E. Lang, has announced that he is a candidate for the office of Prosecuting Attorney of Oakland County. Lang is serving in his tenth year as an Assistant Prosecutor. For the last nine years he has been in charge of the Royal Oak Office of the Prosecutor, which handles the business of the Prosecutor for all South Oakland County. He says his decision to run comes about after due and careful

consideration. He believes that his experience, training, and the executive position that he holds qualifies him for the top post.



Lang's association with the Court House started in 1952 when, while attending Law School at the University of Detroit, he was appointed Oakland County Law Librarian by the late George B. Hartwick, Circuit Judge. Lang subsequently rose to the position of Deputy Court Clerk under the late Lynn D. Allen, County Court Clerk, and served as Court Clerk for the late Circuit Judges George B. Hartwick, H. Russell Holland and Frank L. Doty. He was Judge Doty's Court Clerk until his appointment as Assistant Prosecutor in January, 1955, by the then Prosecuting Attorney, Frederick C. Ziem, now Circuit Judge. He has served continuously under Ziem and George F. Taylor, the present Prosecutor.

Lang, age 39, has resided in South Oakland County since 1955. He was graduated from St. Mary's High School in 1942. He served in the European Theater during World War II and was wounded while fighting in France as a combat infantryman with the 42nd Infantry (Rainbow) Division.

AFTER THE WAR, he received his Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Detroit in 1950 and his Bachelor of Laws Degree from the same University in 1953.

Lang has prosecuted some of the most publicized criminal cases arising in the County; among them the Royal Oak Sniper Case, the Novi Sniper Case, the Royal Oak Township Goodfellow cases, the J.J. Levy kidnap-holdup case, the Walled Lake Sniper-murder case, the Royal Oak Parking Meter case and many others.

He is noted among the lawyers of the County for his aggressive approach and slashing cross-examination in the conduct of a trial.

ONE OF LANG'S chief concerns is to continue to give the citizens of Oakland County superior law enforcement, with emphasis on more liaison between local, State and Federal Law Enforcement Officials.

Lang is a member of the State Bar of Michigan, Oakland County Bar, a vice-president of the South Oakland County Bar, Oakland County Law Enforcement Association, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and the Knights of Columbus.

He has been active in Republican campaigns throughout his adult life and has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Oakland County Lincoln Republican Club.

He, his wife and two children reside at 238 DeVillien, Royal Oak.

Hunt and Fish License Fees To Be Reviewed

The Michigan Tourist Council has called for a full scale review of all non-resident hunting and fishing license fees.

In a Muskogean meeting the Council voted to request a joint meeting with the Conservation Commission to discuss promotional problems related to license fees.

"WE APPEAR to be in the position of becoming non-competitive with our neighboring states and Ontario as a hunting and fishing destination although we offer some of the best of both in North America," according to council chairman Robert L. Woolley of Mt. Pleasant.

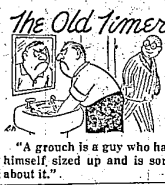
Current non-resident fishing license fees are \$5 annually plus \$2 for a trout stamp. A 15-day non-resident license is \$4.

Non-resident small game licenses are \$20 and non-resident deer licenses are \$35. The small game licenses are required for such major Michigan hunting attractions as pheasants, rabbits and grouse.

Council Director William T. McGraw said that the meeting of the Circuit Judges and County Clerks would be set up as soon as possible. Representatives of the Governor's office and the Legislature will be invited to the meeting, McGraw said.
