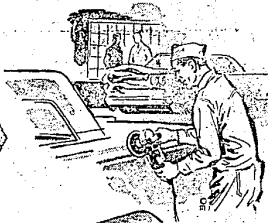

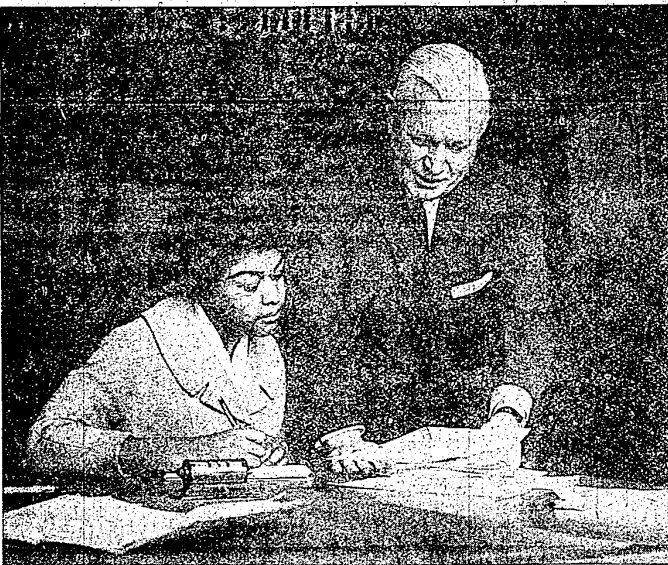

3 Issues Set On Community College Vote

A Community College for Oakland County will definitely be a question on the June 8 annual school election ballot.

The Board of Education of Oakland County has voted unanimously to submit three proposals to the voters: 1.) That a community college district be established; 2.) that a one-mill property tax be levied for its support; 3.) that a six-member board of trustees be elected.

THE BOARD ALSO invited the executive board of the Community College Citizens Committee to a joint meeting to discuss a pre-election campaign.

The Citizens Committee, headed by Wendell Brown of Farmington, has been meeting since November to study the 1963 election in which a majority of voters favored establishment of a college, but rejected the tax support proposal. On February 5, the Committee formally recommended that the Oakland Schools Board resubmit the three-proposal college question on June 8.

"We had only six weeks to explain the issues to voters last year," Brown said. "The act permitting the Oakland Schools Board of Education to call the election did not pass the legislature until the last week in April. We believe there is sufficient time this year to explain fully what a community college is and why we need this kind of institution in Oakland County."

Grandview Slates Symphony Orchestra

Students of the Grandview elementary school are in for a rare musical treat this coming April 23, when members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra present the "EXCURSIONS IN MUSIC" program at that school.

The program, under the auspices of Detroit Adventure Inc., and sponsored by the Ford Foundation along with the Grandview P.T.A., will feature a brass quartet composed of members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. In addition to performing selections from their repertoire, members of the quartet will demonstrate and discuss their individual instruments; children will then be given an opportunity to handle the instruments and answer questions to the musicians.

For the uninitiated, this should prove to be a memorable introduction to symphonic music; an experience which shall be remembered for years to come.
