At a meeting of the Youth Guidance Committee of Greater Farmington held last week, a discussion was held on reported juvenile crime offenses for the year 1963 compared to 1962.

The highest incidence month in the two-year period was found to be August of 1963 when there were 59 offenses or 30 more than for the previous August.

The annual report of the guidance committee is now available and may be obtained upon request. A breakdown of areas in which incidents occurred is included in the report.

One of the projects this guidance committee is involved in is that of finding help for interested youth. To get the youth placed, Richard Carpenter has been named as liaison officer. Farmington citizens are urged to call him if they have jobs such as baby sitting, painting, window washing, typing or any other types of work they would like done. Those looking for young part-time workers or those youth wanting work are asked to call Carpenter at 474-2697.

Another vital project of the youth guidance committee is that of providing adult education classes by professionals versed in juvenile problems. Donations are still being solicited to get these classes under way.

While both the Hygienist and Assistant receive salaries, much of the work is done by volunteers. The P.T.A. Health Chair-

men, for instance, have been responsible for securing the help of mothers who collect fees, keep records and take care of appointments.

NICK ABID, Principal of William Grace School, is the School Principal Chairman for the Fluoride Program. Mrs. Olive Babcock is the Secretary and Treasurer and Dr. James Rensell is the area supervisor.

Weekly visits to the clinic are made by Dr. Henderson from the Oakland County Health Department.

Mrs. Hanna presented an outstanding program of her collection of Christmas plates. The 2 famous Bing and Grondahl company, which makes the Christmas plates, was established in 1883.

These plates, with a different design each year chosen by means of competition among leading artists, have been made annually for more than sixty years.

THE HAND PAINTED design tells a story of Danish life and each year on Christmas Eve the plate mold is broken and that design is never made again. Mrs. Hanna's collection dates back to 1909 with examples of both Royal Copenhagen and Bing and Grondahl.
