

Leaking Roof Problem Back

Efforts to find a satisfactory method of getting away from roof problems have cost the Farmington Board of Education and administrative staff countless hours of time and it appears that a satisfactory solution still hasn't been found. For the Eagle School addition completed recently, a special contractor was hired to keep close tabs on the roofing work but the board learned Monday night they apparently didn't do their job. The board has now agreed to try still another approach: A five-year guarantee will be required from the roofer and the firm's school system has had satisfactory experience with in the past. The school board will also hire its own private inspector for each school construction job in the future and make the inspector directly responsible to them. And, meanwhile, some of the existing school roofs are still springing leaks and causing other problems.
