Zaitcher, Servia, Pays Appropriate Honor to the Only Man Killed in War.

The Servian town of Zaltchar has been rehabilitated in the eyes of all Servia through the magnificent funeral of Reserve Corp. Simon Geor-gevitch, town clerk, slain at Monas-tir.

Although Zaitchar had done its duty in sending two-third of its male population to the war, fate decreed that most of them returned safe and sound and the rest with but alight

cautchar had neither cripple nor corpse as the result of its valor, and this led to invidious comments from the inhabitants of other villages who had suffered severe losses in life and limb.

The death of Corp. Simon, who fell at Monastir, saved the reputation of his native place, and all Zaitchar turned out to do bonor to his memory when the body was brought
