Hill & Dale Garden Club Captures Show Honors

A great honor bestowed upon the Hill and Dale Garden Club of Farmington took place on Saturday, February 24, when they were awarded the gold trophy for having the most blue ribbons in the recent flower exhibit at the recent Home and Garden Show at Cobo Hall.

Accepting the cup was the Hill and Dale Garden Club President, Mrs. Ralph Slade of 28231 Peppermill Road, Farmington. Presenting the trophy in the name of the Michigan Horticultural Society was Mrs. Bert H. Wickling.

THE TROPHY CUP was acquired by the Michigan Horticultural Society through the kind offices of Mr. K. T. Keller through the generosity of the Chrysler Motor Company in 1937. Any garden club receiving the highest number of blue ribbons in the yearly Spring show, receives the trophy for a year. Any club winning the trophy for three years in succession, has permanent possession of the trophy.

FOR TWO YEARS in a row in 1941 and 1942, the Hill and Dale Garden Club came very close to acquiring the cup, losing it both times by one blue ribbon.

On Saturday, Feb. 22, in the Large Niche, entitled "Sculpture," a composition of dried or treated material, featuring a man-made, Kathy Ziska received a blue ribbon. In the section on "Disciplined House Plants," a red ribbon was awarded to Marvel Siegler. Exhibits on the Pedestal, entitled "Sculpture," a composition using fresh foliage and cacti and other succulents, Pauline Rosinski received a yellow ribbon.

In the Miniature Class, entitled "Little Folks," using dried materials, in the class not exceeding three inches, a blue ribbon for Pauline Rosinski, red ribbon for Pat C. a m p Kruger.

In the miniature class not to exceed five inches, Hazel Johannes, blue ribbon; Pauline Rosinski, red ribbon; and Myra Kruger a red ribbon.

On Wednesday, February 26, Marvel Siegler was awarded a red ribbon on her display of the exhibition table, entitled "The Continental Mode."

In the Small Niche, entitled "Occidental Treasures," a blue ribbon for Pauline Rosinski; red ribbon for Myra Kruger; and a white ribbon for Lillian Axelsson.

On Friday, February 28, Marvel Siegler received a red ribbon on her entry in the Large Niche, entitled "All-American," a modern composition featuring fresh material, titled by exhibitor. She titled her entry "Freedom."

The Hill and Dale Garden Club was established in the spring of 1937 and now has grown to the point where membership was limited to 100 members. They became a member of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan in June 1938 under the sponsorship of the Farmington Garden Club.

Beechview PTA Hears Address by Dr. McKinney

The Beechview PTA's February 17 old-fashioned potluck supper was a gastronomic success as in past years. Some 125 parents and teachers seated at banquet tables in the school gym enjoyed a lavish buffet dinner comprised of a wide variety of foods.

Following the meal the assembly was addressed by guest speaker Dr. Dillon McKinney, Principal of the Youth Home School in Detroit. The doctor presented an enlightening address on the delinquency of the "Three Minus One Equals Everything" to a rapt audience.

DRAWING A VISUAL picture of the thin line that divides a delinquent and the cause of his delinquency was one of the points Dr. McKinney instilled a sense of self-examination in those present. With thought-provoking questions such as "What do you stand for?" "What do you really believe?" "What do you really think?" "Do you ever give enough to examine yourself?" Dr. McKinney pleaded for firm, quiet control of your youngsters. Emphasizing the value of the home, he stressed the need and wants structures and control in his life.

As a final point, the doctor urged that "and the cause of delinquency instead of merely treating the symptoms. Throughout his address Dr. McKinney gave thumbnail sketches of the crimes of several youths confined in the Youth Home School, and gave glimpses into the life "behind the walls." The audience, often shocked, often appalled left the gymnasium with a great many questions to ask themselves.

The Beechview PTA feels fortunate indeed, to have heard Dr. McKinney, and wishes only that hundreds of other parents had availed themselves of this outstanding opportunity.
