Rod Brown received an Achievement Key, which is a first place, for his literary article, "The Contrast in Satire of Lewis and Menchen," and an Honorable Mention, a second place, for "To Exercise or Not to Exercise," recently published in the B&W. This free national literary contest for high school students sponsored by the "Atlantic" magazine.

During the course staff received a working knowledge of the performance and field maintenance of the multi-engine helicopter.

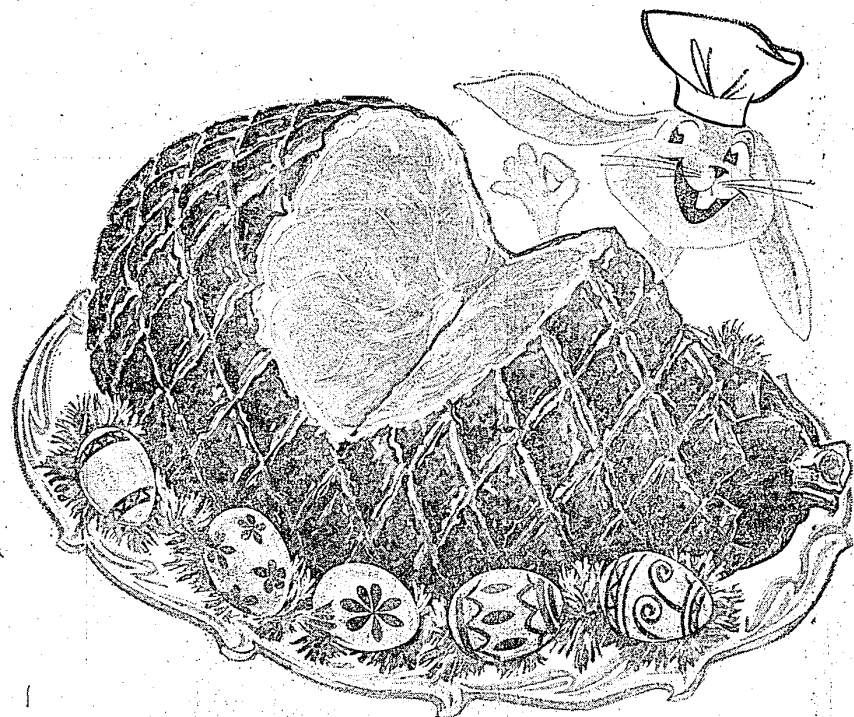
Completes Course At Training Center
