Relates Historical Background On Old Quaker Cemetery Here

(Editor's note: The Farmington Historical Society is attempting to establish evidence that Farmington's Quaker Cemetery, located on Gill Road just south of Grand River, is the oldest Quaker landmark in Michigan. Robert G. Power, descendant of Arthur Power, 1881. They asked the council to "take charge of the Quaker Cemetery, to improve the same to the end that all parties interested may have their rights." On April 22, 1881, a full board being present, the council called a hearing of all interested parties and it was unanimously agreed to by the council to take over the cemetery and to make "such improvements as they deemed best, and survey and plot the same, and assess the cost to the holders."

On May 22 of the same year, money was appropriated for this purpose. Apparently, the "interested parties" were satisfied with the subsequent action taken by the Farmington Board of Education. The cemetery has stood up through the years.

When one considers that this cemetery was established only eight years after the first pioneers appeared in this area it becomes plainly evident that this is probably the only physical landmark left which marks the earliest site of a Quaker settlement in Michigan.
