**Orthopedic Clinic Helps Area Children**

The Detroit Orthopedic Clinic, a Torch Drive service, is providing total orthopedic care to nine physically handicapped Farmington youngsters and one from Farmington Township.

The clinic, only agency of its kind in Michigan, provides treatment from birth to 21 years of age to youngsters handicapped by meningitis, osteomyelitis, arthritis, tuberculosis of the bones or joints, muscular dystrophy, amputations, congenital anomalies and dislocations, polio, and cerebral palsy.

THE "WHOLE CHILD" concept pioneered by the founders of the clinic provides for physical, emotional, mental, and social treatment. This is done by having available highly trained pediatricians, medical social caseworkers, occupational therapists, nurses, educational specialists, consultants in every field of medicine, orthopedic surgeons, dentists, physical therapists, speech therapists, and orthopedic appliance technicians.

The work of the staff and consultants with more than 2,000 handicapped children is supplemented by volunteers.

The Orthopedic Clinic was founded in 1926 by Sigma Gamma, a group of school girls organized in 1916 to help in child welfare. One of the principles of which the clinic was founded was that it extend complete orthopedic care to children from birth through 21 months of age, and that the child's care. On special referrals, however, the clinic does extend to private patients care that cannot be found elsewhere, at audited costs.

Currently, approximately 11 per cent of the clinic's budget comes from receipts from services rendered, and an equal amount from gifts. Torch Drive dollars, of which \$250,000 were allocated to the clinic last year, make care of 75 per cent of the budget.

THE CLINIC, headed by M. Genevieve Blakeley as its executive director, is housed in a modern building which has three floors for that purpose and owned outright by the clinic. It is centrally located at 5447 Woodward Avenue in Detroit, adjacent to the Wayne State University, and the approved Medical Corridor.

As a result of its intensive concentration in the orthopedic field, and intensive training for the orthopedically handicapped, the clinic is an approved training center for several of the professions, such as physical therapists, speech therapists, and occupational therapists.
