

Slate Jefferson-Jackson Day Topic for County Democrats

"Poverty is one of America's more crucial problems," Levin asserted. "President Johnson has outlined an attack on this serious problem and our March 21 program will focus on state and local action we can take."

FEDERAL and state officials will participate in morning and afternoon discussion groups and workshops on pilot plans for eradicating poverty in America. The first session will be at 10:30 a.m. and the final workshop will conclude at 4:30 p.m. when a reception will be held for Democratic officials and candidates.

A noon luncheon will honor outstanding ticket salesmen. Participants will see the initial performance of political satire by "The Democratic Five and Their Hootenanny Parodies."

In keeping with its traditional educational crusade, the Foundation will not solicit funds at any time during April, a month nationally observed as Cancer Control Month.

Airman Completes Far East Duty Tour

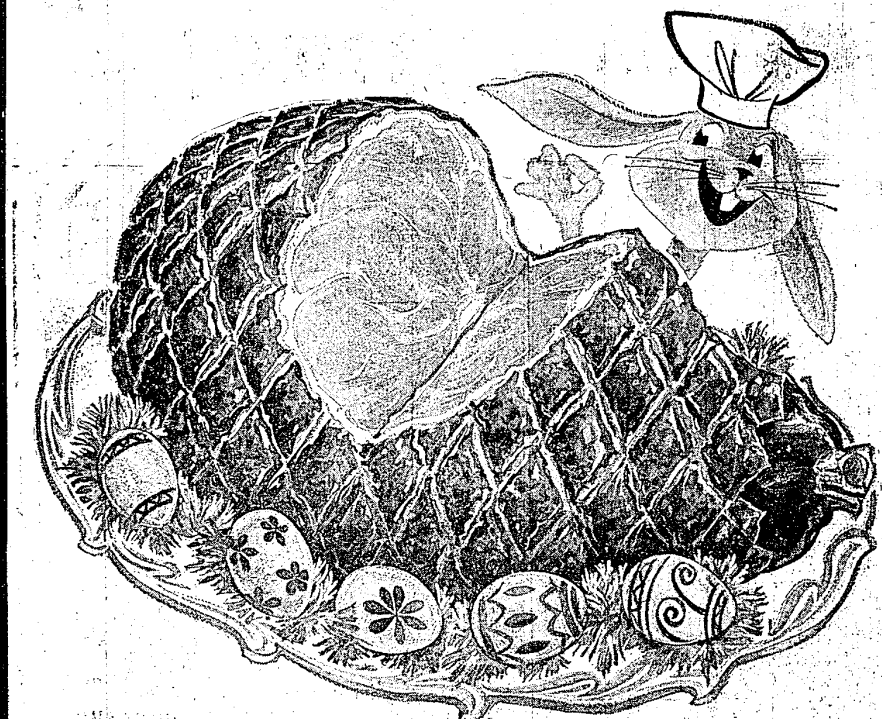
