White Chapel.

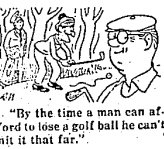
Surviving besides her hus-

**Linderman's Bakery in Plaza
Grand Opening This Weekend**

Linderman's Dutch Bakery in
the Farmington Plaza shopping
center is now holding its Grand
Opening.

The owner and manager,
Harry J. Linderman, has been
a baker for many years, hav-
ing had experience with several
fine bakeries in this part of
Michigan.

In earlier years, he worked
for Saitas Bakery in Trenton.
He was with the old Northfield
Bakery on Plymouth Road in
Detroit for several years. In
1937, he was co-owner, oper-
ator of a small retail bakery in
West Dearborn.

For the past six years, Mr. Linderman has
been with Terry's Bakery in
Plymouth.

HE COMES from a pioneer
family in Dearborn and the
Romulus Township area. His
German grandparents settled in
a farming area in Romulus
Township and his parents still
live on the old homestead.

Mr. Linderman is married to
the former Jean Van Houten
from Dearborn, of Dutch de-
cent. They have four children.

He is a U.S. Navy veteran of
World War II and served in the
south Pacific where he was
chief baker aboard a troop
transport. He attended bakers'
school in the navy and took

**Probation Sentence
For Sanders Bandit**
The man who held up the
Sanders Store in the downtown
Farmington shopping center
January 20 and was captured
the next day with most of the
\$169,100 was sentenced Tues-
day in Oakland County circuit
court to three years probation
and ordered to make restitu-
tion.

Farmington police chief
Maurice Foltz credited the alert
efforts of Lee BeGoie, chief of
police in Novi, with the quick
arrest of the bandit. Chief Be-
Goie had stopped Marcus L.
Gingell, 33, of Northville as he
was fleeing from the holdup
after hearing a description of
the car used by the bandit.

for the water project were held
on Monday morning, Decem-
ber 2, 1963. Supervisor Hall
credited the help given by coun-
ty officials in behalf of the
township's water project.

HALL SAID, "without their
cooperation this vital project

There were more than a doz-

which played a role in develop-
ing the project along with the
township and county. The coun-
ty has contracted with the city
of Detroit to supply the water
and the county DPW will main-
tain and service the water sys-
tem.

rate of growth for the township
in general.
