Visit to Holland Reported By FHS Exchange Student

"The people were real friendly, and really nice to me," stated senior Miriam Gordon, "and everyone went out to greet me."

Miriam visited Hague, Holland, this past summer as an FHS "foreign ambassador" through the Michigan Council of Churches (M.C.C.) program. She spent two months in Holland and another two weeks in Germany, where she visited an old friend, Carol MacKichan.

Miriam reports that she had no real trouble understanding Dutch, but speaking it was another matter. Her Dutch sister could not talk to her because she was afraid he would make too many mistakes in his English.

Everyone tried to get used to it, but I just couldn't.
