Local Science Teacher Hears Nat'l Speakers

Donald Schult, sixth grade teacher at Farmington's Middle and Elementary School, attended the 22nd Annual Convention of the National Science Teachers' Association, which was held in Chicago, Illinois from March 20-24.

Over 3,000 science teachers from all parts of the United States and several foreign countries attended the meetings. Mr. Schult has had an opportunity to meet with science teachers, consultants, supervising teachers, and administrators representing each area of science at the elementary, secondary, and college level and to visit teacher demonstrations, film showings, and displays of new curricular materials. Also at the Convention was the largest exposition of science teaching materials, supplies, and equipment ever assembled at such a meeting.

THE SCIENTIFIC Enterprise and the Educative Process was the overall theme of the meeting. Included among the nationally known speakers who addressed the science educators were Dr. Robert Sonne Cohen, Chairman of the Department of Physics at Boston University and an international known physicist; Dr. Harold K. Schilling, Dean of the Graduate School at The Pennsylvania State University; Dr. Melvin W. Barnes, Superintendent of Schools, Portland, Oregon; Dr. Paul F. Brandwein, Director of Physics Institute for Studies in Conservation, Milford, Pennsylvania; and Dr. Ethel M. Alperstein, Professor of Anthropology at New York City University.

The National Science Teachers' Association enrolls some 30,000 members and subscribers. This represents the largest, junior and senior high schools and colleges, as well as persons in administrative positions in science education. Thus NSTA is the largest U.S. organization dedicated to teaching and improving the teaching of all the sciences commonly taught at the elementary, secondary, and introductory college levels. The Association is a department of the National Education Association and an affiliate of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.
