U-F's Community Information Service Aids 34 Persons Here

Have a problem? Dial 833-3450.  
"May we help you?" is the comforting way the confidential service begins hundreds of times each day at Community Information Service, a Torch Drive agency.  
During the past year, 22 Farmington residents and five from Farmington Township got in touch with CIS when they needed help. Their needs may have involved getting nursing care in the home, psychiatric treatment for children or adults, adoption and boarding care services, legal aid, facilities for the aged, personal or family counseling, camping opportunities, financial aid, or anything else in the field of health, welfare, or community service.  
THE PROBLEM may be an aged father or a disturbed child, a faltering marriage, or eviction from a home, a distraught employee, or a destitute medical patient.  
Trained, experienced social work counselors go to work quickly and efficiently. They "diagnose" the problem. Then they "prescribe" one of the hundreds of community agencies best equipped to help. There is no time lost, no embarrassment, no fee.  
Not only the troubled, but physicians and attorneys, business and labor personnel, schools and churches, clubs and organizations, voluntary and governmental agencies often call on CIS.  
This essential service, made available to everyone by contributions to the Torch Drive, is Metropolitan Detroit's only central clearing house for information and referral on health, welfare, and recreational resources.  
THERE ARE 650 available health and welfare agencies in this area, of which 197 are supported by the United Foundation. The remainder are public tax-supported services. The experienced, trained workers at the CIS make it their business to know precisely what each of these agencies is best equipped to do.  
During the past year, 11,476 inquiries were received by CIS, of these, 40 per cent became "cases" for one or more of the 650 agencies. Most of the queries, 82 per cent, came by telephone, 42 directly from the public. The other 58 per cent were referred by other agencies or organizations.  
The United Foundation, which raises money for 197 agencies through its annual Torch Drive, referred 1,000 calls to the CIS.  
Miss Evelyn M. Fraser, director of the CIS, said that more calls regarding out-patient clinics were received than on any other subject.  
SO MANY CALLS were received concerning services for the aged, that two years ago the CIS set up the Metropolitan Referral Service for the Aged, to help persons 60 years of age and older. In 1963, 1,490 requests for help were received by this service. Five of these were from Farmington.  
If help can be found within the 650 agencies or even in any other community resource, CIS can get the request through.  
Miss Fraser admits, however, that there may be problems for which there is no solution. "No service available," however, is the answer given to fewer than 1 per cent of the queries received last year.

County Starts Youths Village

Construction of the Oakland County Children's Village for wards of the Probate Court-Juvenile Division got under way this week. The 50-acre site is located behind the Pontiac State Police Post at the County Road, Pontiac.  
The initial three units, which are to be constructed this year, are planned to ease overcrowded conditions at the County Children's Center and provide separate facilities for problem youth.  
Two weeks ago the Board of Supervisors awarded contracts for the three initial units at a total cost of \$775,000. The facilities will be used for the rehabilitation of juveniles and will include two youth cottages (halfway houses) and a special services unit for youngsters with emotional problems.  
Future plans call for the addition of 12 more units by 1980. Besides housing, the Village will include a school and special treatment facilities to prepare children to return to the community.  
In 1946, Mr. Gildemeister returned to banking in Farmington as assistant cashier of the Farmington State Bank and he carried that title with him when his bank merged with the National Bank of Detroit in 1953.  
MR. GILDEMEISTER was elected Treasurer of the City of Farmington in 1952 and ably served the City in that capacity for 15 years.  
He was a member of the Salem United Church of Christ in Farmington where he had been active for many years in the choir. He was also an active member of the Farmington Elks Lodge, BPO Elks No. 1886. He was also noted as an enthusiastic coin collector.  
Mr. Gildemeister rested at the time of his retirement, July 15, 1963.
