Assessed Value Up \$1.3 Million

An increase of just under \$1.3 million in the total assessed valuation of property in the City of Farmington over last year was reported last week by City Manager John Dinan.

The city's assessed valuation for the current year new stands\_at \$22,587,720. What the state equalized valuation will be upon which school and county taxes are levied will be announced a little later when the city's equalization for the current year is established.
