### The Advantages Outweigh the Disadvantages

Those who complain about the noises, unpleasant smells, increased traffic congestion and other minor annoyances which industrial plants sometimes cause better start looking at industries advantages as well as their disadvantages. We have been for sometime now, and gree continuing to do so.

Last week we received from the City of Farmington, at our request, some detailed comparative figures on the amount of taxes received from an area developed with light, industry, and, a comparative amount, of land-area developed with an above average type of single family residential homes.

amount of land area developed with an above average type of single family residential homes. The figures serve to show very conclusively and factually that every community needs a balanced amount of industrial development with its residential growth if the citizanty is to have the services, and facilities it wants and should have without heing buried under with high tax bilts.

For the comparison, actual assessment and tax figures were used and not estimates or average figures. The figures showed the exact amount the community is now receiving in tax moneys from that which is under development on Eight Williams of the small industrial park which is under development on Eight amount of land area developed with above layerage single family homes in the nearby. Farmington Acres Subdivision were then stacked up against those derived from the industrial park area developed to date. The ten industrial plants now in the industrial park have a total real and personal property assessment of over \$776,000 and pay a total in taxes to the community of over \$40,000. On a com-

parable amount of property in Farmington Acres Sudivision there are 33 somes having a total assessment of under \$220,000 withey yields approximately \$14,560 in taxes or only about one-third as much as the same amount of land developed industrially.

But, there is something of even greater significance than the difference in tax yield. This is the fact that the average home brings with it to the community an average of between one and one-half and two school age children who must have classrooms provided for them and be educated. Based on state averages, it is now costing almost \$400 per year per average household. This does not take into consideration the amount needed each year to pay for the school buildings to educate them in either.

It points out a plain and simple truth. Even homeowners living in above average homes paying \$450 to \$600 a. year in taxes can't carry the load alone. Substantial amounts of tax money from industrial and commercial enterprises are definitely very much needed for a healthy community.
