Church to Have Series on Sex; Starts Sunday Problems posed by the conflict between man's biological sexuality and the official morality of the American culture form the basis of three meetings to be held by the University-Unitarian Church of Farmington, beginning at the 10 a.m. service April 12. The first will be titled "Fornication: Fruit or Ultimate Language?" Describing the series of talks, Mr. Eddy said he felt honest examination by liberals was needed in "three increasingly prevalent patterns of sexual behavior: fornication, homosexuality and adultery." "We liberals have rejected the usual standard for determining what is right and wrong - Bible, church and custom," he added, "but we have not developed a substitute ethic to guide us in this perplexing area." The minister said he would consider carefully whether it would be prudent to judge "sexual gratification is different in moral content from satisfaction of hunger." Mr. Eddy pointed out that when he accepted his present ministry he promised "to examine all of life within its ethical dimension and added: "I remind the public that what is presented from our pulpit is strictly one man's opinion and no one should assume that my opinions reflect those of even one other member of our congregation."
