Farmington once again made a good showing in their second big track meet of the year, the Spartan Relays. The meet was held last Saturday at Jensen Field House on the MSU campus, East Lansing.

In the first race, the Shuttle Hurdle relay team failed to qualify for the finals but showed great improvement over the previous meet's performance. The Two Mile relay also failed to place but was paced by good running by Karwoski, McGaw, Watson and Harvey.

Also competing in the afternoon were the field event men: Ron Smedley missed qualifying in the broad jump with a leap of 19 feet 5 inches and Neil Warner was shot in the Put.

Evening running began with the Sprint Medley Relay, headed by Dick Stoney, Gary Popp, John Lockwood, and Gary Schulz; the time was fast enough to place them ninth in the event. The 880 Relay led by Gary Lockwood, Russ Robinson, Bob Negoshian and Ron Cleveland ran a fair race of 1:38 and hopes to do better in their next meet.

The best FHS showing came next, in the Mile Run, in which Dennis Hunt took a second to Bob Richards. Dennis' time of 4:29 was quite good, considering he had a chest cold.

The last Falcon race, the Mile Relay, was run at a fair pace, 3:38, with all-around harman, John Lockwood, running the anchor leg in 52.7 seconds.

Coach Fordy Kennedy feels the team is on the verge of running some outstanding times but "the bad weather has been holding us back."

The first Falcon dual meet will be held tonight at North Farmington at 4 p.m. The clubmen will be at their best and should be strong enough to leave the Raiders in a "Cloud of dust."

FHS Baseball Coach Looking For New Talent

Coach Steve Branz has been whipping his 1964 Police baseball team into condition despite the persistent cold weather. Working out in the gym the team has been in good form and hopes to get outside on the diamond as soon as possible.

Branz has only six returning lettermen of which only four of them saw considerable action last year. The returnees are second baseman Terry Nielsen, catcher Dick Johnston, shortstop Keith Watson, and first baseman Jim Stevenson. Gary Heist and Carl Misch saw only limited action last year. Coach Branz is also relying on a few new faces from the reserves to round out the rest of the lineup for the Farmington opener slated for April 14 at North Farmington.

On the mound will be, along with Gary Heist, Steve Page, Bill Freeman, John Winder, Al Klais, and Jim Vandusen. Craig Graves and Dick Johnston are battling for the catching position while Terry Nielsen is making it rough for both senior Keith Watson, at shortstop, and sophomore Mike Perry at second. Senior Jim Stevenson appears to have the inside track at first base but will be pushed by hard-slugging sophomore Dan Harriman. This base will probably be held down by either Carl Misch or Barry Aneda. Candidates for the outfield are Paul Martin, Dave Richer, Dan Heist, Steve Page, Barry Aneda, John Winder, and Dave Harriman.

"In our conference," said Coach Branz, "I believe that Farmington has a team to beat; however, we gave them a battle last year — they beat us 5-3."

Offer Bowlers Scholarships In New League

A new innovation in bowling leagues will be introduced at Farmington Lanes, starting Sunday, September 13, consisting of sixteen teams made up of fathers and their sons.

We all know that bowling is one of the few sports in which the whole family can participate. This special league will provide an opportunity for boys and their dads to enjoy a close relationship every Sunday.

THE LEAGUE is forming now with over \$1,000 in scholarships to be awarded as prizes. The cost of bowling will be \$3.50 per team each week and the Scholarship fund will range from \$100 to \$200 to be used by the winners toward attending the college of their choice.

Entries will be limited to six teams in this application of this application of the following rules:

1. The league will bowl Sundays at 1:15 p.m. starting September 13, 1964. Teams will draw for alleys and bowl with no handicap the first week.
2. Bowling will continue for 33 weeks.
3. The fee will be \$3.50 per team weekly.
4. Handicap will be 80 per cent each week.
5. Absentees will use their average less 10 pins.
6. No substitutes will be allowed.
7. Scholarship fund will be based on 16 teams.
8. Teams will bowl for four points each week.
9. Officers will include: President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.
10. The league will be sanctioned by A.B.C. and F.B.A.
11. The sanction fee for both organizations to be paid by each team the first week of bowling.
12. All teams will receive trophies according to their finishing position.
