ing to members of the city council as they did to the planners. The main arguments were that any of this small piece of property other than for homes would devalue their residential property values and that they definitely did not want any buffer between their homes and the swim club and expressway was needed.

Emphasized again and again by homeowners in the audience during the long hearing was the fact that this property was not residential when they bought their homes and that they were assured re-zoning was not planned for any adjoining properties. Many held that office buildings at this location would be a detriment to the whole residential neighborhood.

COUNTING the homeowners' arguments along with the fact that the city had an official of the Suburban Lands Co. that owns most of the lots on James Court which is immediately adjacent to the triangular parcel.

One point emphasized by them was that nearly all who own the property on James Court, that a would be directly affected, feel that office buildings on the triangular piece would help them sell homes on the James Court lots yet to be developed. Kelly said that if this was being found impossible to sell the property on James Court still undeveloped due to the fact that there are no suitable buffer buildings between the swim club and expressway and these single family residential lots.

A map was presented by Kelly to show that most of those who had signed a petition against the re-zoning are actually some distance away from the property which Fleming was seeking to have re-zoned. He noted also that a couple of citizens in the audience voicing opposition to the zoning change were actually from the Farmington Acres Subdivision, far removed from the area in question.

FOLLOWING his practice of the past on controversial zoning matters of this kind, the council voted to delay action on making a decision on the re-zoning request until its next regular meeting on April 20. Mayor Lindberg explained that this was done to give councilmen time to weigh all the arguments presented both pro and con in an effort to come up with a decision in the best interest not only of nearby homeowners but of the city-at-large as well.

According to City Manager John Dinan.

Based on the present tax rates for small residential and commercial property, the industrial park when totally developed would yield between \$135,000 and \$150,000 in real and personal property taxes to the community annually. The same area in above average single family residential homes would yield only about \$45,000 in property taxes or less than one-third as much as the industrial developed land.

WHILE a small area developed with industrial plants in a community may result in a little additional cost due to additional services that must be rendered and present a few minor annoyances also, it doesn't anywhere near match the additional cost to the community that the same amount of land area developed residentially costs. The average household in a community has between one and one-half and two school age children. Based on latest state averages released, it costs about \$400 annually to educate each child in our public school system. The additional cost to a community for schooling along with the occupancy of each new single family residential home, therefore, is between \$900 and \$900 a year. This does not include the costs involved in providing the school buildings in which to educate the additional youngsters, or the additional buffer buildings between the swim club and expressway.

EVEN FIGURING that half the cost for school operations comes from state aid payments to our school district and does not have to be paid for with local property taxes, it would still be safe to say that the average new home occupied in a community requires approximately \$500 to \$600 more in local school taxes to be spent. The cost of providing the new buildings and facilities needed to educate the new pupils which nearly every new home brings runs high.

When the other services such as garbage and rubbish pickup, added police and fire protection and so on are taken into consideration, it is quite easy to see that the statement "the average family in a community doesn't pay its own way" is a very true statement.

Our community needs a good balance of industrial and commercial development along with its residential growth. Actual local tax figures substantiate this statement.

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
