## MSU Garden Tips Offered

Transplanting? Here are some suggestions from Michigan State University garden authorities. Dig a hole twice the size and depth of the "ball" of dirt and roots. Then you can put in good soil, peat moss or perhaps spread out the roots. Do not apply fertilizer in contact with the roots.

Pack carefully by watering and fill hole to the ground level. Then let the water hose run until water no longer runs in. Build up a dam in a circle around the bush or tree and fill it full of water. Water often for a few days before filling in and leveling soil. It is then best to mulch for a few weeks and water twice a week.

If trees, shrubs or bushes are bagged or in tarpaper pots, all the wrapper so roots can get through. Remove bag or pot if you can without disturbing roots. Be sure and pack soil firmly around new plant in hole.

There are "good" and "poor" trees, shrubs and evergreens for each area, say MSU garden authorities. Your local nurseryman can tell you which plants are best.

Avoid the lament with the "miracle tree"—it may not be for you.

## A Clean-Up Job Helps Flower Beds Prosper

A good clean-up job around flower beds, rose beds and shrubs in fall is the best insect and disease protection. Early spring clean-up and burning of diseased leaves, especially from rose beds, will also save summer problems.

Michigan State University horticulture specialists suggest that you spray early and well. Read labels and abide by directions.

There are some "good" all-purpose sprays on the market that control both diseases and insects in yards and gardens. Sometimes you need to treat for specific problems, too.

Here are some MSU rose gardening tips:

For scale on evergreens use Sevin or Malathion. For red spider mite use any good miticide such as Kelthane, Tedion or Oratran.

Aphids on any plants can be controlled by Malathion.

Anthrax on a sycamore and pine can be stopped by organic mercury at the time of bud swelling and another spraying 10 days later.

Dusting is easier than spraying and can be effective if air is still and the foliage is covered with dew or moisture at time of application.

thoroughly in a pall before pouring into the sprayer. Don't spray too sparingly, but enough is enough. After spray is running off plant, the job is done.

Spray most ornamentals about once each month, May through August. But roses need to be sprayed every week or ten days. Think of it as a preventive measure.

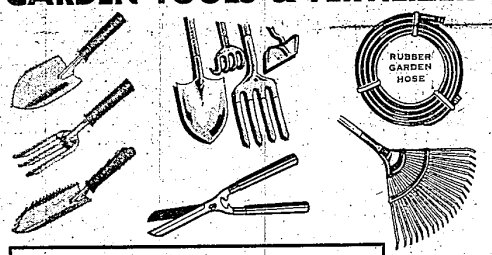

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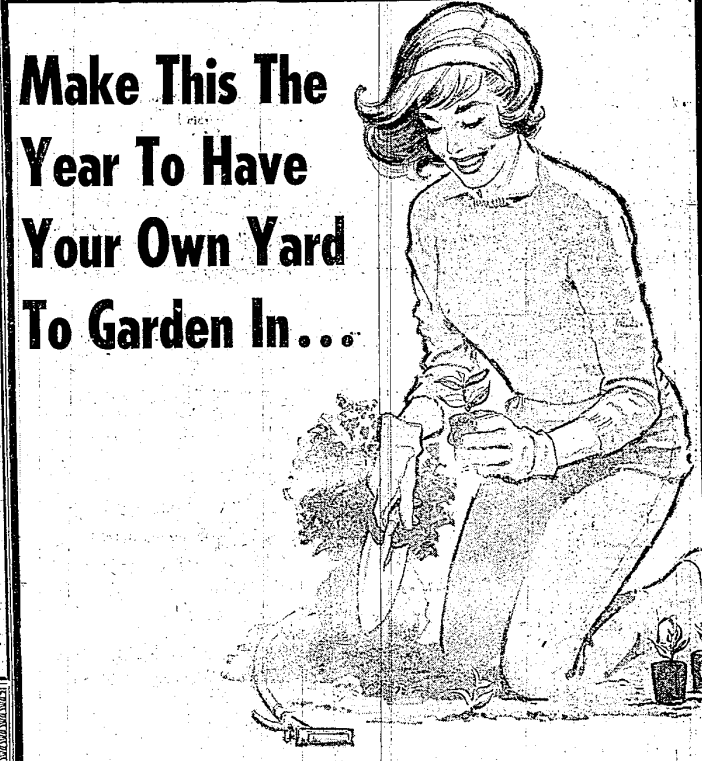
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
