## FHS Thinclads Perform Well At Rice Relays

The Falcon thinclads took four place and carried away three trophies in the highly competitive Brother Rice Relays last Saturday in Birmingham.

Neil Warriner mustered the only points in the field events for the Falcons when he took a fifth in the shot-put with a thrust of 44 1/2 feet.

The thinclads won their first trophy by placing first in the distance medley relay (800-440-1320-mile). Dick Moore ran his fastest quarter of the year, 53.3, and Dennis Hunt turned in the fastest mile of the day with a 4:23 anchor leg. Joe Watson ran the 880 and John Karvoski the 1320.

The team's highest scorer, Ron Smedley, finished a respectable fourth in the 120-yard high hurdles posting a time of 1:52. Russ Robinson, Bob Nogoshian, Ron Cleveland and Gary Lockwood placed a sixth in the 880-yard relay.

The sprint medley relay (440-220-220-440) proved to be the greatest Falcon effort of the year. John Lockwood and Gary Schulz ran brilliant quarters clocked at 51.8 and 52.4, respectively.

Bob Nogoshian also turned in fast times as the cindermen were timed in 2:32, second fastest in the state. The Falcons ran up their second trophy with this fine performance.

Sophomores Randy Taggart and Ron McGraw teamed up with Juniors Jim Harvey and Tom Mitchell in taking fourth in the two-mile relay. Robinson, Nogoshian, Cleveland and Gary Lockwood came back from their 880-yard relay and finished third in the 440-yard relay.

Coach Kennedy packed the mile relay in an effort to break the record. Moore, Schulz, John Lockwood and Hunt captured the third trophy with a time of 3:35, two seconds slower than the record.

Falcon times were exceptional considering the rain, mud, and wind that marred the meet.

Farmington scored 43 points in placing behind Catholic Central (53 1/2), U-High (49 1/3) and Birmingham Groves (48 1/3) Conference foes Berkeley and Walled Lake did not even come close to the Birds. Twelve teams entered the meet.

'The Falcons' will open their league season with the South-hill relay at home today at 4 p.m.

## Secosky Captures First Place At Olympic Wrestling Tryouts

Stan Secosky of Our Lady of Sorrows is continuing to amass top season honors in wrestling tournaments. His latest accomplishment was capturing first place honors at the Regional Olympic Tryouts held in Zeeland, Michigan, April 17 and 18, stands as one of the finest athletes performing ever turned in by a local high school boy.

The one-time 138-pound All-State wrestler in the 171.5 weight class at the Regional Olympic Tryouts and was awarded first place over John Schneider of Lansing.

Secosky won top honors after pinning his first opponent, deciding his second opponent and battling to a 2-2 draw with Schneider who was heavier by twenty pounds. The first place nod was given to Secosky due to the ruling that in the event of a tie in all points considered the decision is awarded to the lightest man. Secosky just missed qualifying for the next lightest weight division, 154, by being one pound too heavy.

In capturing the Regional Olympic Championship, Secosky became eligible to advance to the Final Olympic Tryouts to be held August 24, 25 and 26 at the New York World's Fair. The top two contenders in each weight division from the 20 Regional contests will be competing in the Finals.

Secosky, one of eight wrestlers from the Hazel Park Recreation Club who earned berths for the Olympic finals, is a senior at Our Lady of Sorrows. The Hazel Park Club is under the tutelage of Dean Rockwell, coach of the U.S. Greco-Roman Wrestling Team.

Also performing well in the Ontario meet was Rick Reda of Our Lady of Sorrows. Reda earned a second place berth in the 123.5-pound weight class. He wrestled a grueling schedule of five matches and was decided by the eventual winner, 2-2, on the basis of a take-down awarded in the final 30 seconds of the match.

Reda pinned two men who faced him in the times of 4:10 and 5:20. The two other decisions in his favor were 4-2 and 6-3. He had only one less black point than the winner in his weight division.
