**N'ville State Hospital Plans Mental Health Week Open House**

An annual event of considerable local interest is Mental Health Week's Open House Sunday at Northville State Hospital. This year, that week, by Presidential decree, is April observance, and to R. Mrs. P. W. Dickinson, with Open House Sunday observed one afternoon only, April 26.

Staff members, volunteers, and patients are extending invitations to interested citizens to tour a modern mental hospital. Such tours commence at 1 p.m. with visitors encouraged to come early in the afternoon. The last tour will leave the hospital lobby at 3:30 p.m. The hospital reached easily by exiting on Seven Mile Road, just about a mile and a half east of the City of Northville.

**TOURS WILL INCLUDE** not only visits to wards, but to many hospital areas where one will be able to learn at first hand the important contributions of skilled staff members in the treatment effort. On the routes of the tours, there will be exhibits of the activities of the patients. The work of interested volunteers will be described.

It is suggested that comfortable footwear be worn. As the distance is considerable among the buildings on the hospital's 500 acres, buses will ply among the areas to be visited.

For the third year, Mrs. James Fitzgerald, Metropolitan Senior Advisor of the Girl Scouts of Metropolitan Detroit, has contacted members of Girl Scout troops and their leaders to supervise a nursery for children under 14, too young to tour.

**Beechview PTA Plans Science Workshop Ap. 27**

The Beechview PTA will meet on Monday night, April 27, at 8 p.m., to participate in a Science Workshop prepared by the staff and students at the school.

Beechview's multi-purpose room will be transformed into two general areas within the world of science: "the human body" and "general science." Each grade, kindergarten through sixth, will have an exhibit on both topics. Parents and hope an opportunity to see what their child is being taught in science, and will learn the methods used in teaching this subject by actually performing many of the experiments used in the class room.

**AS AN EXAMPLE**, one of the exhibits will be on the five senses. Within this area parents will be invited to identify food by smell, taste, and texture while blindfolded. The parent will therefore not only see an exhibit prepared by the students and their teacher, but will participate in the same experiments used to teach the child.

Ken Lachmann, Principal of Beechview, his staff and their students have devoted a great deal of time and effort in preparing this Science Workshop and hope that parents will avail themselves of this unusual program.

The April 27 meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the all-purpose room, where the newly elected PTA officers for the 1964-65 season will be installed. Following this brief ceremony parents will adjourn to the multi-purpose room for the Science Workshop, and refreshments will be served to conclude the evening.
