**Universalist Sermon Topic For May 2 Set**  
A comparison of the non-violent methods of Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King will be considered by Robert Miles Eddy Sunday, May 2, in his talk at the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington.  
The sermon title for the 10 a.m. service is "Non-Violence-Strategy of Faith."  
MR. EDDY SAID he would discuss the various sit-in and stall-in methods of achieving social justice, and indicate that sometimes these methods seem violent in their inception and can be violent in their outcome. He added he would consider the responsibilities of a citizen rights leader whose non-violent demonstration results in a riot, and ask whether non-violent techniques could be continued without an underlying non-violent faith.  
"I'll try to answer these questions with the help of a look at the struggles of Gandhi and Dr. King to keep their followers from abandoning their war against hatred whenever a battle against injustice - in Birmingham or Cleveland or Detroit - seems lost," Mr. Eddy said.  
Regular discussion groups will be held at 11 a.m. for the ethical discussion group, led by Robert Nelson, will begin consideration of such matters as status symbols, white lies, false modesty, insincere political and other promises and hidden persuader advertising.
