Past Community House Efforts To Aid Expansion of Library

The decision was made last September by the directors of the Farmington Area Community House Association, Inc. to dissolve that Association. The association had been formed in 1955 to provide and maintain a District Library, which is operated jointly by the City and the Township.

The dissolving action was culminated recently with the distribution of remaining assets in the amount of \$5,553.52 to the community house for the city and township for expansion purposes.

The articles of incorporation of the FACHA stipulated that all assets, in the event of dissolution, be transferred to the City and Township governing bodies. The funds were therefore given to the City and the Township equally and the governing bodies each unanimously approved the suggestions of the Community House directors that they be given to the District Library for improvement and expansion of its facilities.

The decision of city and township officials to turn over these funds to the district library is a just return of community contributed funds to be used for overall community interests.

The Library Board of Trustees expressed its deep appreciation to all persons involved on behalf of the citizens of the city and the township for this fine monetary contribution to the current program for library expansion.

It is to be recalled that many organizations and groups of citizens of the City and Township of Farmington cooperated with the Community House Association during its brief years of activity with the hope that its objective might be realized. The FACHA's goal was a place to house recreational and educational projects for our youth and where exhibits of local art works might be shown. They wanted a location for garden

shows and other similar endeavors of local groups and organizations.

IT IS THE hope and the plan of the Library Board of Trustees that the expansion of library facilities will eventually provide at least a portion of the objective of FACHA pioneers in civic improvement.

The enthusiastic cooperation of many of our city and township organizations in the Community House objectives will be recalled by "A Day in the Country" on the grounds of Botsford Inn and the previous year's "Circus" on the grounds of the present Kendallwood Convalescent Home. The flower shows of the Farmington Garden Club, the plays by Farmington Players and the many exhibits planned for these occasions, even including those of Farmington Friends of the Library all contributed.
