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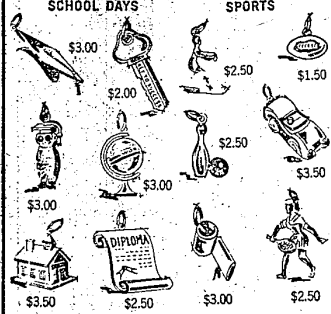
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Democratic Club Tribute To JFK Slated

(Continued from Page 1A) the construction of a sidewalk along the north side of the parking lot and another walk leading to the main entrance-way at the school.

The PTA officials said that they felt the parking lot should be blacktopped. It was explained to them by board members that this would make the project much more costly and that it would be impossible to go to the extent on improvements at this school at this time.

TWO POINTS in connection with the proposed blacktopping of the lot were made. One was that it would be unwise to blacktop until after the gravel and base brought in for the expanded parking area had time to compact well. The other was that to provide a blacktopped parking lot at this elementary school would result in requests for such hard surfaced lots at all 15 other elementary schools in the district and others to be built in the future. This would be very costly for the school board to do, Richard Peters, board vice-president, pointed out.

It was also brought out during the discussion that drainage conditions around three sides of the school site was quite poor but there was no official action taken with regard to improving this condition.

The Kenbrook PTA officials seemed satisfied with the improvements the school board agreed to make.

(Continued from Page 1A) The Industrial Park area, known officially as the Farmington Freeway Industrial Park, Area, includes approximately 600 acres of land which the township hopes, with the addition of sewer and water facilities, will attract industry.

There is a source of revenue the township can draw back on should the desired industry be slow in moving into the industrial park. Township voters have pledged a one mill tax levy to retire the township's portion of the sewer construction costs. It is felt, however, that sufficient funds will be made available through the connection charges to be levied by users of the system to make it unnecessary for the township to fall back on the millage pledged by voters.

THE POSTMASTER urged that patrons transact as much business with the post office as they possibly can on weekdays to reduce the need for any services on Saturday. He pointed out that stamps can be obtained from the vending machine in the post office lobby even when the counters are not open.

No essential major postal services will be effected by the expensive cutback order, Trombley emphasized. There will be no changes in home regular letter and parcel delivery or distributing and regular business mail deliveries will continue as usual.

All letters and other first class mail will be handled with the same priority as in the past. (Continued from Page 1A) this year, on the other hand, is \$29,507,780 and only slightly more than \$20 million below its equalized valuation as established by the county.

Because of these widely different assessing practices the township is given a very high equalization factor to apply against the assessed valuations placed on its properties while the county is only slightly higher than its actual assessed values.

This year the township's equalization factor is 2.1477054, up .07 from last year's factor. The city is 1.1462705, up approximately .05 from last year.

As was pointed out earlier, however, these figures are still not final since the state equalization board could make some adjustments.

The important thing for taxpayers to remember is that taxes are levied on the basis of state equalized valuations and not assessed valuations.

Twp. to Act on Sewers

Final consideration on the establishment of a special assessment district to provide sanitary sewer facilities for Regal Orchard Subdivision has been set for the Township Board meeting of May 11. The hearing will open at 8 p.m.

New Percentage Pay Plan OK'ed

A new pay schedule system for teachers, handling special assignments such as coaching sports, directing debate or other "extra" duties, was officially approved by the Farmington Board of Education Monday night.

It provides for pay for those special teachers on a percentage of the amount of their base pay ranging from a high of ten percent downward to two percent.

The ten per cent amount will go only to head football and basketball coaches.

2nd Heather Hills Sewer Hearing May 11

The Farmington Township Board set their next regular meeting, Monday, May 11, as the date to conduct the second hearing on the proposed to establish sanitary sewer facilities in Heather Hills, Heather Hills 1 and Heather Hills 2 subdivisions.

The first hearing on the Heather Hills sewer improvement was staged Monday night, April 27, at which time the Board also heard from property owners who were in attendance, voted unanimously to proceed with the establishment of a special assessment district to finance the project. The May 11 hearing will open at 7:30 p.m.
