Joint Program Set At OLS for Sunday

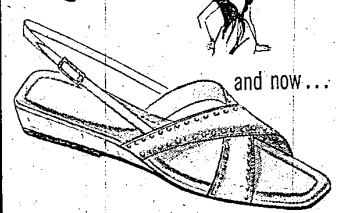
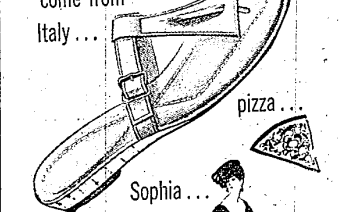
