The Kalamazoo Plan for full-year education also includes six months of foreign study for qualified juniors and off-campus independent research for all seniors. Vacation terms are staggered around the calendar for both students and faculty.

DURING THE Spring term, sophomores are encouraged to take part in the career-service quarter, through which they are placed in their choice of college-arranged jobs.

Buy Bus Chassis, New Station Wagon

The purchase of five new school bus chassis from O'Green Ford of Farmington at a total cost of \$14,220 was authorized by the Farmington Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night.

Board action had been taken earlier authorizing the purchase of the bus bodies on a joint bidding arrangement with other school districts through the county board of education.

A special education station wagon costing \$2,253.75 was also authorized to be purchased from O'Green Ford.

Extend New 3-Year Contract to Harrison

A new three-year contract has been extended by the Farmington Board of Education to G. V. Harrison as superintendent of the public school system.

His salary was set at \$18,500 ranging upward over the three-year period to \$19,500.

Two-year contracts were also extended to James M. Read and Marjorie M. VanAmeyde as assistant superintendents for the district at salaries of \$14,400 the first year and \$14,800 the second year.

Summer School Classes Again To Be Offered

Summer classes in band and orchestra instrumental study will again be offered to all students in the Farmington area, according to Richard Tyler, director of the Farmington Public School summer session programs and adult education.

The summer session will commence on June 15 and continue through July 31, a period of seven weeks. A fee of \$10 will be charged for all summer classes.

Farmington Safety Patroller To Tour the Nation's Capitol

A safety patroller from Oak and Robert Voss of Muskegon, Michigan, will go on a four-day trip to Washington, D.C., as Automobile Club of Michigan's guest at the A.A. National Safety Patrol Rally Thursday, May 7.

This is the 25th consecutive year that a group of Michigan youngsters has been taken to Washington on the expense-paid trip as a reward for spending an average of 180 hours yearly on street corners in all kinds of weather protecting their classmates.


MOST OF THE 330 boys and girls throughout the school districts chosen to make the trip will converge on Detroit by bus, originating from Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo and Bay City.

The three buses from these points will join a Detroit bus at the Veterans Memorial Building the afternoon of May 7 in a caravan to the nation's capital.
