Raider Diamondmen Defeat Oak Park

Northern's diamondmen opened the season April 23, as they defeated the Oak Park Indians 4-1, evening their overall record at 2-2.

Lee Martilla started on the mound for the Raiders and gave up 2 hits and 2 earned runs in 2 2/3 innings before lead.

Chuck Viane relieved in the sixth to finish the contest. Oak Park opened the scoring in the second inning allowing two runs. Jim Actelli, Bill Hall and John Knox, crossed the plate in the top of the third to give North Farmington a 3-2 lead.

Falcon Thinclads Post Mile Relay Team Record

Falcon thinclads brought home another trophy as the elite Mile Relay team of John Lockwood, Joe Watson, Dennis Hunt, and Gary Schulz managed to set both the school record and the Central Relays record last Saturday. The time of 3:28 smashed the FIS Varsity record by 4 seconds and brought in a first place.

The meet, held at Mt. Pleasant, claims to be the nation's largest high school meet.

FHS events began with the Two Mile Relay in the morning. Made up of Ron McGraw, Giovanni Zibetti, Joe Watson, and John Karpowski, the relay team shaved seconds off their previous time at the Brother Rice Relays.

Ron Smedley competed in both hurdle events, taking eighth place in the 180 yards. He also competed in the broad jump but failed to qualify.

The Central Relays (220-110-220), of Russ Robinson, Ron Cleveland, Ron Smedley, and Gary Lockwood, then brought in a fifth at 1:10.

Sparked by John Lockwood, Dick Moore, Gary Schulz, and Dennis Hunt, the Middle Distance Relay (800-400-800) brought in a third place, breaking the previous Central Relays record by 7 seconds; first place being taken by Seaborn.

The last event, the 500 Relay, was run by Robinson, Moore, Cleveland, and Lockwood. Taking fifth for a three-way tie at 1:53, F.H.S. lost the toss, failing to gain the fifth place medals.

The sandloters finished out their scoring with two runs in the sixth. Passes to Stevenson and Page and then Bill Freeman's two run double tallied the final two runs.

In all, the Falcons accumulated twelve hits and seventeen bases. After playing the Huskies at Pontiac Northern, the Falcons will host Waterford Kettering Saturday at 12:00 p.m.
