Timely Tips on GARDENING

Do you live in a community that is filled with beauty or in one that is blighted and ugly? Each individual shares in the responsibility, but the age or costliness of the homes and buildings is not the thing that determines whether or not an area is a pleasant place in which to live. Rather it is determined by such factors as neat maintenance, comfort and practicability, and appeal to our sense of beauty.

Maintenance is important for the beauty of an area. Trash and debris lying or blowing around will mar the loveliest scene whether it is in the heart of the city or in the open country. Adequate lighting, however, the state or degree of grooming depends on the individual situation. On small city lots, lawns must be mowed regularly, while on rural acreage it may be satisfactory to have a rough meadow-like lawn. Likewise, ribbons of wild flowers lining the highway may gladden the hearts of motorists as they speed by, but the same flowers growing in a vacant city lot may be objectionable weeds that would be better cut down.

CONFORT AND usefulness also determine whether an area is pleasant. Are the walks in the right places? Is there convenient parking? Is there shade from the hot summer sun? Can winter snow be easily removed? Does the home have a welcoming light by the entrance? Does the public building have a light in the parking lot? All these can influence our opinion as to whether it is a pleasant place to be.

Less obvious, but of great importance is the size and scale of the areas we use. If we must walk across a vast unbroken asphalt parking lot to get to the grocery store, or if we must walk down a city street waded in by tall blank buildings, we are made to feel dwarfed and insignificant. We are made to feel uncomfortable, although we may not realize it, just what trees and shrubs and accessories such as benches can help bring these things down to a more "human scale."

People seem to have been born with a love of nature and a feeling for the natural beauty of trees and rocks and sky and flowers. Instinctively we want to be a part of nature, and getting into natural surroundings

and in boxes on city streets. Now, as Spring is beginning to clothe the world in living green, is a good time to take a look at your surroundings. Remember, as you look, the ancient Arabian proverb that says the eye sees only what the mind comprehends. Look critically and searchingly at surroundings that may have been so familiar that you are oblivious to them and are really overlooking them. Look at your own yard. Look up and down your street at your neighbors' yards. Look at your shopping center and at the main business street. Look at the location of your own yard, country crossroad. Do you see beauty or blight?

REMEMBER: The Spring planting season is here and this is the time to plant trees and shrubs. Shade trees, fruit trees and ornamental flowering trees should be planted as soon as possible. Small trees can be transplanted bare-rooted if they are still dormant and have not leafed out. Larger trees are safely moved with a ball of earth around the roots. Spring is the best time to transplant broad-leaved evergreens such as rhododen-

Evergreens with needles can be planted later in Spring or earlier in Fall than deciduous plants. For Spring planting move them just as new growth is beginning to come out or slightly before this. May is the ideal month to transplant or divide perennials. Continue planting seeds of hardy vegetables and annuals. By the end of May, seeds of tender plants and small plants of ten or fewer vegetables and flowers can safely be set out.

Spraying is a controversial subject, but fruit trees, roses and many other plants may need this protection. Avoid modern chemicals as much as possible and stick to old-fashioned sprays as much as possible. Use even these with utmost care and caution.

Now the lawn when it reaches a height of three inches. Use grass clippings and weeds to start a compost pile. Look around at the blossoming trees and shrubs and enjoy the beauties of nature. Make a record of things you have planned and the dates, and also note varieties you see in other yards that please you.
