THE FARMINGTON Police Department had investigated a total of 98 traffic uccidents the first three months of this year compared with a total of 19 for the same period in 1983.

Twp. Votes Higher Taxes For Police, Fire Protection

In a very disappointing voter showing on Monday, approval was given Farmington officials to levy an additional \$2 per \$1,000 in taxes on the equalized valuation of property to provide for expansion and improvement of the township's police and fire fighting forces.

The proposition giving the township the right to levy \$2 additional in taxes for the police and fire departments for the next ten years carried by a 98-vote margin. Out of those who cared enough to get out and vote there were 693 who favored paying the additional taxes to get added protection and ser vi e's saginst \$58 who were opposed to taking on the additional final-cial burden.
