# Human Rights Synod Staged By Lutherans

"The Church and Human Rights" was the theme of the Third Annual Convention of the Lutheran Synod of the Lutheran Church in America at its meeting in the Jack Hall Hotel in Lansing, this week, May 17-20.

Addressing the convention on the place of the Church in the affairs of human rights was the Rev. L. William Youngdahl, Secretary for the Community and Cultural Affairs Committee of the Lutheran Church in America's Board of Social Ministry; and Mr. Wesley T. Cobb, Executive Director of the United League of Filipinos.

ATTENDING The convention from the Farmington area were the Rev. and Mrs. George Stegmier, of the Lutheran Church of the Incarnation on Ten Mile Road; and Mr. Milton Jones and the Rev. Carl F. Kallreider, of Antioch Lutheran Church, Thirteen Mile and Farmington roads.

The Rev. Dr. Frank P. Madison, president of the 40-member Michigan Synod, presided at the convention and introduced the Rev. Dr. George P. Harkins, Assistant to the President of the Lutheran Church in America, scheduled to outline the progress of the Church's work during the past year. Also scheduled to appear on the program was the Rev. Dr. Stewart W. Herman, newly elected president of the Lutheran Church of Theology at Chicago.

The Michigan Synod is one of the thirty-one Synods of the Lutheran Church in America, the largest Lutheran body in North America, and has its Synodical headquarters in Detroit.

## Cornerstone For New Church To Be Laid Sun.

The Corner Stone will be laid on Sunday, May 24, at 3 p.m., for the new Nardin Park Methodist Church at Eleven Mile Road just west of Middlebelt Road in Farmington. Officiating at the service will be Bishop Marshall R. Reed, Bishop of the Michigan Area of Methodism.

Bishop Reed was elected to the Episcopacy when he was senior minister at the Nardin Park Church.

Assisting Bishop Reed in the service will be the Rev. Herbert F. Hauser, Superintendent of the Detroit District of the Methodist Church.

THE FIRST UNITS of the new building now being erected are a Sanctuary to seat 500, a partial Fellowship Hall with fully equipped kitchen, and an educational section for church offices and rooms for younger children. The church will be completely conditioned.

The approximate cost of the sections now being erected is \$800,000 including twenty acres of land. Starting July 1, the congregation of 1700 will worship at the East Junior High School on Middlebelt Road just south of Eleven Mile Road until the new building is completed.

Nardin Park Church has three ministers: Rev. William D. Mercer, the senior minister, who lives in Southfield; Rev. Jon M. Clapp, who is Minister of Education; and Rev. Frank F. Benish, Minister of Parish Visitation.
