Local Teacher Picked for Special Training in France

Mrs. Miriam Hall of Farmington is among thirty second-year school teachers of French selected to participate in the advanced level National Defense Education Act Institute to be held this summer at Arcachon, France.

The Institute is sponsored jointly by the U.S. Office of Education and the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, Massachusetts.

Mrs. Hall teaches at Farmington Senior High School. She is a graduate of University of Michigan and has also studied at Michigan State University and Wayne State University.

Selected in nationwide competition to which more than four thousand French teachers with training in a first-level institute in the U.S.A. were eligible, Mrs. Hall will spend nine weeks in France from June 17 to August 19.

Set up in the linguistic and cultural atmosphere of France, the Institute is designed to improve competence in areas of language and culture and in the prove teachers' professional teaching of advanced high school courses. It will be staffed by American and French specialists.

Each participant from a public school will receive a stipend of \$75 per week while in attendance at the Institute and an allowance of \$15 per week for each dependent.

The University of Massachusetts Institute will open with a week of planned study in Paris, where a sociological approach to present day France will be begun. Highlights of the week in Paris include visits to The Comedie Francaise, Versailles, UNESCO, the new Maitland de la Radio (including television), the Sorbonne.

At Arcachon, in cooperation with local authorities, teams of navigators will explore recent urban and regional planning, occupations, education, public health, recreation, and regional art. Conducted excursions to Mont-Michel and the Chateaux Country as well as to the Pyrenees are a part of the study program. Group travel through the Northwest, a region rich in geological, historical and artistic interest will conclude the nine-week Institute.
