Local Student Wins Bentley Scholarship

Beverly Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph M. Smith, 3018 Eastfield, Farmington, has been named winner of the Alvin M. Bentley Foundation Scholarship to Ferris State College for the academic year of 1964-65.

A student at North Farmington High School and a former winner of the American Legion Citizenship Award, Miss Smith's Bentley Foundation Scholarship will amount to \$375 for the academic year and is one of the major awards presented to 51 Michigan Colleges and Universities by the Foundation this year.

"YOUNG PEOPLE of the caliber of Beverly Smith should be encouraged to advance their education to meet the challenge of tomorrow's leadership," Alvin M. Bentley of Owosso said in making the announcement of the award. "The Foundation, which Mrs. Bentley and I set up three years ago, could do no better than to recognize Miss Smith's past record with an investment in her future."

Students graduating this year from Michigan High Schools applied for the scholarships at the 51 Michigan institutions receiving the grants. Selection of the winners were made by the scholarship committees of the colleges and universities. The Bentley Foundation is currently contributing \$75,000 for scholarships for the academic year 1963-64. Its commitments for the coming school year will bring total contributions to nearly \$200,000 for the three years the Foundation has been in operation.

Trustees of the Foundation determine each year which Michigan institutions will benefit from the Foundation program, which is "to administer

funds for science, education and charitable purposes." The institution itself determines who will receive the individual scholarships which may amount up to a maximum of \$750.

SEVERAL AS AN advisory group and being representative of the colleges and universities is a Scholarship Committee for the Foundation consisting of: The Rt. Rev. Edgar P. Bukowski, President, Aquinas College, Grand Rapids; Victor F. Spitzel, President, Ferris State College, Big Rapids; William R. Striton, Vice President, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor; Dr. E. T. Williams, Vice President, Michigan Technological University, Houghton; and Raymond Anderson, Registrar, Lansing Community College, Lansing.

In addition to the scholarship program, Foundation Trustees have also made grants in furtherance of the other objectives of the Foundation. Serving as Trustees are: Mr. and Mrs. Alvin M. Bentley; Owosso; Dr. Charles L. Ansbach, President Emeritus, Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant; Al. Brown, former Chairman of the Board, Detroit Edison Company; Mark C. Stevens, Vice President, Detroit Bank and Trust Company; Ray M. Whyte, Detroit Businessman and Civic Leader; Norman L. Des Jardins, Owosso Attorney; and the Hon. Harry F. Kelly, Michigan Supreme Court Justice, Honorary Trustee.

LADIES STEP FORWARD

Cutting The Preteen's Hair For Curl And Compliments

A way with winter-weary coiffures for girls of all ages. Even the ten-year-old miss who is so proud of her hair she wears her new spring outfit.

A new do should be a prettier do—and for this young miss, Jean's has cut and styled the hair to encourage its natural wave tendencies and to flatter her particular facial feature: a high forehead, wide cheek bones and a narrow chin.

To encourage the natural curl hair is graduated in the back so that the length above the nape line is shorter; the hair thus falls naturally into a wide fluff. For height through the top and crown areas, Jean layers the hair beginning about an inch away from the scalp. A variety of different lengths through a high degree of tapering will produce natural buoyancy.

Both scissors and a razor are used for the cut. Sides and back are cut blunt first, then affixed with scissors for flexibility on the ends. In addition to the top and crown sections, the razor is also used on the bang to achieve a soft, feathery effect.

Jean's emphasizes that the natural growth pattern must always be followed in cutting and setting the hair. When natural growth is utilized, hair combed after a cut will lie neatly and attractively on the head. Sets, too, last considerably longer when the style has been planned in accordance with the growth pattern rather than against it.
