Timely Tips on GARDENING

VIBURNUMS are a group of pointed at each end. The flat handsome shrubs that are now laden with a profusion of white blossoms. About a dozen species grow wild in Michigan and many of these plus varieties imported from Europe and Asia are to be found in a real garden.

One of the most attractive is the high bush cranberry, *V. trilobum*. This native American shrub grows ten to twelve feet tall and has leathery, three-lobed leaves somewhat like small maple leaves. The flat clusters of flowers are interesting because the outer ring of flowers of each cluster are very showy, like large snowflakes. These are sterile. The flowers in the center are tiny, creamy-white fertile flowers that produce the fruit. They are acid and bitter and most birds do not find them attractive food, but in mid-winter cedar waxwings will avidly strip them from the bushes. They are reputed to be an acceptable substitute for market cranberries when cooked or made into jelly.

The European cranberry bush, *V. opulus*, resembles the American *V. trilobum*. It has a similar flat white flower clusters and red fruit. There is a variety of it that has attractive apricot-yellow fruit, and a dwarf variety which doesn't flower at all but makes a good plant for a low, informal hedge.

Viburnum tomentosum, dwarf-ble-fied viburnum, is an out-standing shrub. It grows eight feet tall and has leathery leaves
