## Plan Summer Art Workshops

The Summer series of art workshops for young people of the Farmington area will begin July 7 and extend through August 13. They will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday of each week at Farmington Senior High School, on Shawnessy west of Orchard Lake Rd. Each age grouping will meet once a week for one-and-a-half to two hours.

The series is sponsored jointly by the Farmington Public Schools and the Detroit Art Institute. A fee covers the cost of the instructor and the materials used. The Detroit Art Institute furnishes materials, films and other materials from its collection for use by the classes to motivate the lessons in various art media.

MR. KENNETH ROSE will coordinate the program for the Institute.

The classes are encouraged as a supplement to the regular art curriculum in the Farmington schools and are open to all interested students in the area. Special art talent is not as important as a genuine sincere interest in the arts.

## Awarded Grant for Summer Training

Mrs. Marilyn Manning of 28800 Base Line, Farmington, a teacher at Franklin High School, Livonia, is one of 12 secondary school teachers selected to take part in the seven-week Summer Spanish Institute at Kalamazoo College under the auspices of the National Defense Education Act of 1958. The program will run from June 25 to August 12.

The Summer Language Institute at Kalamazoo College is one of 85 such institutes to be conducted at various colleges and universities for the improvement of language teaching. The programs are supported by funds from the U.S. Office of Education in contrast with host institutions.
